## progress

Another year has come to a close at Animal Humane. Reflecting upon the global issues that affect us all...the economy, the environment...sometimes one feels helpless, with little hope of having any impact on these problems. However, we can take joy in making a difference here, at home. Together we are making astonishing progress towards improving the lives of companion animals. Thanks to our dedicated staff, volunteers, Board of Directors and you, our wonderful donors, we continue to transform lives, one pet at a time.

Our No. 1 goal remains sheltering homeless pets and finding them new, loving homes. Since January, **we have re-homed over 4,600 pets.** We are also celebrating our progress in saving lives: **for the past 24 months, we have adopted 100% of the healthy pets in our care.** As an open-admission shelter, this is an amazing accomplishment. Reaching this milestone is the result of a multifaceted approach that includes promoting long-term pet residents, operating two satellite adoption centers, our Foster Care program, mobile outreach events, and supporting adoption programs like Cats Around Town!, which just adopted out the 400th cat since the program began in 2009.

We have also made significant progress in reducing euthanasia—down 65% since 2006. Only 10% of pets received this year have been euthanized and in each case for behavioral or medical issues. This low rate qualifies us as a “No Kill” shelter, a term we prefer not using because of its polarizing effect. The results are

real; many more pets’ lives have been saved due to our orchestrated efforts. Hundreds of dedicated hands are needed to achieve these results, from the excellent daily care provided by our Animal Care team, to the advocacy for each pet by our Adoptions, Behavior and Foster Care teams, and by our Veterinary team’s expert medical care that is provided to every shelter pet.

Foster Care is a key element in this success. Over 820 pets have received extra special care from our foster parents this year. From kittens and puppies left in boxes at our front door to dogs recuperating from heartworm treatment, our foster parents gave these pets a new lease on life.

Our volunteers play a significant role in caring for and promoting our pets for adoption. They support us by creating compelling photographs and descriptions to post on our website, patiently handling a timid cat and teaching much needed life skills to a dog that has lived its whole life alone in a backyard. Our volunteers make a difference in so many lives.

## more progress

We are also proud of the progress we have made in keeping pets in our care healthy. We have achieved a major reduction in the incidence of upper respiratory infection (URI) in our feline residents by incorporating stress-reduction protocols such as covering carriers when moving cats from one location to another. Combined with other measures, we have reduced the number of cats succumbing to URI from 20% of intakes in 2010 to 10% this past year. Better yet, the number of cats and kittens that recovered completely from URI rose from 66% to 94% in 2011.

Our feral cat (un-owned/community cats) program is delivering tremendous results. Since 2008, Animal Humane has sterilized over 6,700 ferals through our Trap/Neuter/Return (TNR) program. Nationally, feral cats produce 82% of all kittens born and are the major source for homeless kittens entering shelters. Thanks to our investment in TNR, we have seen a whopping 43% decline in kitten intakes this year.

## circle of care

We introduced our Circle of Care this year to illustrate Animal Humane's support for our community. As donors, your giving helps support a rich array of 20 programs that are making a dynamic impact in our community and our state every day. **Taken together, our Circle of Care programs touched the lives of over 21,000 pets and 22,000 pet owners in 2011.**

SPAYNM and 505 Pit Crew are new additions to our Circle of Care. SPAYNM is a statewide program that helps pet owners find affordable spay/neuter services. Using either our toll-free number (1-855-SPAYNMX) or our SPAYNM.org site, pet owners can locate clinic services in their area. The SPAYNM team also provides education outreach at locations ranging from The Storehouse, a nonprofit providing food and clothing to families in need, to the Santa Domingo and Jemez pueblos.

505 Pit Crew is a youth-oriented program focused on ending dog fighting. Many children are introduced to dog fighting before the age of 10 and begin fighting their own dogs by the time they are teenagers. Our 505 Pit Crew program combines humane education and outreach with free dog training classes, in an effort to convert these young owners from dog fighting to showcasing their dogs' talents in sports such as agility. They are given the education and tools needed to be responsible dog owners.

## progression—looking ahead

Animal Humane continues its leadership in working towards the humane treatment of companion animals. We currently chair the New Mexico Animal Sheltering Board's Shelter Standards Committee. The Committee will be recommending standards of care to be used by New Mexico shelters to provide humane housing and care for all sheltered animals. We hope that over time, these guidelines will transform the lives of all sheltered companion animals in our state.

Now in our 47th year, the Board of Directors embarked on a long-range planning process to guide Animal Humane over the next decade. The endeavor led to the creation of our Vision Statement: **Animal Humane envisions a society in which every animal is treated with respect and compassion.** This vision must be realized at home. Our campus needs to be a role model for this standard and serve as a demonstration site for the humane treatment of companion pets. In taking stock of our current facilities, we know that despite our many incremental improvements, many of our animal quarters are noisy, lacking in comforts and create a high level of stress. Our model for all animal housing is our wonderful Robbie Jones Memorial Cat House—where cats bask in the sun and live enriched lives climbing and perching. We wish this level of housing for every pet in our care.

To that end, we have created a Master Plan that embodies this vision. Our goal is to provide consistently humane housing for every pet at our Virginia Street campus, regardless if they reside in an intake area, are undergoing medical treatment in a quarantine room or they are available for adoption. To protect the health of our pets and speed their adoptions, we plan to build new and renovate current facilities that will provide the most humane, healthy and stress-free environment possible for the pets we serve. Details of this undertaking will be shared in the coming months.

## heated blankets speed recovery

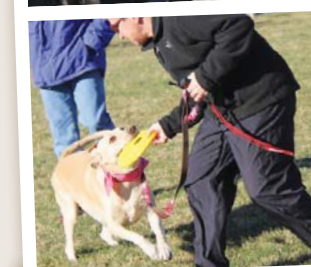
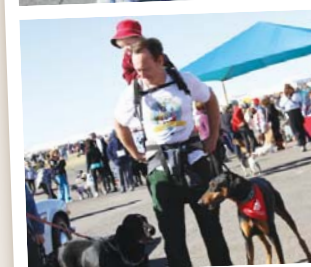
Dr. Jackie Blanchette, Chief Veterinary Officer, has warmed up our surgical suite with heated circulating water blankets. In an effort to minimize heat loss during surgical procedures, all pets undergoing anesthesia in our Donor-Subsidized Veterinary Clinic are kept warm from heated water flowing beneath them. The blankets keep a pet's body temperature close to normal, helping them

regain consciousness and recover more quickly post-surgery. Water blankets are used on three surgical tables during the 60-75 surgeries performed Monday through Thursday, as well as a fourth table used for 14 weekly dentals.

## PetSmart chooses Animal Humane

Animal Humane proudly operates Bernalillo County's largest Free-Roaming Cat Spay/Neuter initiative. We began this valuable program, commonly called Trap/Neuter/Return (TNR) for feral, un-owned cats in 2008. In January 2011, Animal Humane was awarded a two-year TNR grant from the prestigious PetSmart Charities® to continue our efforts.

Over 300 nonprofits applied for this valuable funding, and our organization was one of only 30 animal shelters chosen nationwide. The \$132,640 grant covers the costs of sterilizing 2,356 feral cats in six target zip codes: 87102, 87105, 87106, 87107, 87108 and 87121. The areas were selected due to their high level of ferals. Feral cats outside the defined zip codes may also be sterilized at Animal Humane's Clinic. Costs for these latter surgeries are subsidized by the Albuquerque Animal Welfare Department which reimburses Animal Humane \$15 per surgery.

"Animal Humane's TNR program is a great example of taking initiative to improve the local community," says Susana Della Maddalena, executive director of PetSmart Charities. "Targeted programs like these are the key to successful, low-cost spay/neuter in local communities. Cumulatively, they are making a huge impact on pet overpopulation nationwide."

Concerned citizens wishing to have feral cats sterilized by Animal Humane may secure cat traps at 615 Virginia St SE, with a refundable \$50 deposit. In addition to free rentals, there is no cost for sterilization services.

There are vast amounts of evidence that show effective TNR programs are the only way communities will reduce their feral cat population. Aggressive sterilization leads to colony stabilization and ultimately elimination.

Animal Humane is grateful for PetSmart Charities' investment in our community. We also give our sincere thanks to Street Cat Companions, an Albuquerque-based volunteer rescue group sponsored by New Mexico Animal Friends. Street Cats skillfully leads a devoted group of citizens who humanely trap and care for feral colonies in our community. Their partnership with Animal Humane will help us reach our two-year goal of sterilizing 2,356 feral cats—an effort that will greatly reduce the number of homeless kittens entering our shelter year-round and ultimately save countless lives.

### jo ann's joy

At 74 years young, Jo Ann Boyd is one of thousands of senior pet owners benefiting from Animal Humane's Donor-Subsidized Veterinary Clinic. Her two Dachshunds, Jesse, an 11-year-old female and Beau, a 12-year-old male, have visited our Clinic numerous times since our doors opened in 2007. Over the years, the two pets have received annual vaccinations, dentals and most recently treatment for Jesse's renal failure.

Jesse and Beau are Jo Ann's only family in Albuquerque. She lost her husband to cancer three days before their 53rd wedding anniversary in December 2009 and her son passed away in February 2008. Now, Jesse and Beau are her "constant little sweethearts" spending hours in her lap when the three are together.

Having access to affordable, quality veterinary care is invaluable to Jo Ann. "Animal Humane goes to great lengths to help your pet and they take care of me too!" says Jo Ann. She thinks our Clinic team is "Just wonderful!" Our services have kept her cherished pets healthy, as the two run laps in the house like spry puppies.

Jo Ann is grateful her pets' love fills her days...and her nights too. She recently bought a new king-sized bed, providing ample space for the three to cuddle and sleep safe and sound by one another's sides.

### behavior training leads to a fortunate match

Janice and her family had previously owned two Staffordshire Terriers. After 10 rich years together, her beloved pets made their way over the rainbow bridge. While recovering from the passing of her pets, Janice started thinking about adopting another dog. She first saw Fortune (now Emily) at AnimalHumaneNM.org. Janice said "to her surprise her car just drove her to Animal Humane" to meet this two-year-old beauty.

When Janice met Emily it was love at first sight! During a second visit with her husband, Henry, Emily immediately bonded with him... joyfully rolling over on her back for a long belly rub! Janice and Henry were smitten and knew Emily was going home with them.

## big miracles come in small packages

In early October, Deona Swager's family discovered a box on the side of the road. When the box moved they knew someone needed their help. Inside they found a two-week-old Blue Brindle American Pit Bull Terrier mix. "He was so tiny, his eyes were still closed," Deona explains.

As soon as this adorable puppy was removed from the box, Deona and her family noticed a large bulge on his side and a back leg much shorter than his other limbs. They suspected the puppy was abandoned because his family feared the veterinary bills that would ensue.

The next morning, the Swager family began calling veterinary clinics seeking affordable care for the puppy they had rescued. The first clinic they visited offered euthanasia services—nothing more. By mid-morning, Deona arrived at our Donor-Subsidized Veterinary Clinic with a puppy she had named Ensign Blue.

Following an examination by our Chief Veterinary Officer, Dr. Jackie Blanchette, Deona received an estimate for Ensign Blue's surgery. Although our charges are a fraction of private practice fees—through streaming tears, Deona answered, "I cannot afford the surgery." Following Deona's honest and heartfelt response, our Clinic team shared news about our Pet Save program, a service made available through private contributions to cover medical costs for pet loving parents who cannot afford emergency care.

When Deona knew Ensign Blue would receive the life-saving care he needed, a load was lifted from her shoulders. Moments later, Ensign Blue underwent surgery. He had several congenital deformities—including a large inguinal hernia, a heart murmur and a deformed leg. The hernia was removed and the small, deformed limb was left intact, given that the limb caused Ensign Blue no discomfort. Ensign Blue spent that evening in the home of Veterinary Assistant, Tiffany Clampet, who bottle fed him every two hours throughout the night.

The next morning, Deona returned to our Clinic and took Ensign Blue to his new home—agreeing to return every two weeks for checkups. This timeline allowed Dr. Blanchette to monitor Ensign Blue's recovery until he was old enough to be neutered in our Clinic. During a visit the following month, Dr. Blanchette noticed that Ensign Blue now suffered from an umbilical hernia and was a cryptorchid—both of which she corrected during a second surgery.

Initially, Deona struggled to understand why someone would abandon their pet when they could surrender them to Animal Humane. However, these days, she is filled with gratitude. She wishes to thank Animal Humane's Clinic team for providing quality veterinary care and for showing great kindness to her and Ensign Blue. She is also thankful for our donors who contribute to our Pet Save program and her family for their generous babysitting services during Ensign Blue's long recovery.

She reports that Ensign Blue is very popular. "Everyone knows his name in my neighborhood. People love to see him because his exuberance and unbridled joy makes everyone so happy...including me."

# senior pets need your help

Between June 1-October 31, 2011, 305 senior cats and dogs were surrendered to our care. This represents a 46% increase over the same period in 2010. Of those admitted in recent months, 40 cats and 60 dogs were between 10 and 20 years of age.

Through our diligent efforts—and the kindness of adopters willing to accept the responsibilities and often higher medical bills associated with older pets—the majority of these pets have been placed in loving homes.

## 10 reasons to adopt an adult or senior dog

1. Many adult dogs are **already housetrained**; you will not have to go through the challenge and mess of teaching them manners.
2. Adult dogs are not teething puppies; they **won't chew** your shoes and furniture as they grow.
3. Adult dogs have **learned what "no" means**. This makes introducing them to your household's rules all the easier!
4. Adult dogs settle in easily because they have learned what it takes to get along with others and **become part of a "pack."**
5. Adult dogs can focus more easily than younger dogs because they have mellowed. Therefore, they **learn quickly**.
6. Adult dogs **let you sleep through the night** because they are accustomed to human schedules and don't generally need nighttime feedings, comforting or bathroom breaks.
7. Adult dogs **leave you time for yourself**. They do not make the same demands of your time and attention that puppies and young dogs do.
8. What you see is what you get. Unlike puppies, adult dogs have **grown into their shape and personality**. Puppies can grow up to be quite different from what you first see and experience.
9. Adult dogs are **instant companions**, ready for hiking, car trips and other activities you enjoy.
10. Older dogs are **skilled at giving love**. Once they get into their new forever homes, they are **grateful for the second chance you have given them**.

## 10 reasons to adopt an adult or senior cat

1. Well cared for house cats can **live up to 20 years!** So if you decide to adopt a kitten be prepared to provide the **love and care** needed for the next 20 years of both your lives.
2. Adult cats are still **playful in their own individual way**, but usually require less one-on-one play time and do not require as much **attention** as a kitten.
3. What you see is usually what you get with an adult cat, which means **fewer surprises with health and behavior issues in the future**.
4. Adult cats require much **less maintenance and supervision** which makes them much more tolerant of being left alone.
5. Adult cats tend to be **less destructive** as most of those pesky kitten behaviors are outgrown during the first few years of a cat's life.
6. Adult cats tend to be **more tolerant, patient and resilient**, which makes them ideal for families with small children who are still learning appropriate animal-handling skills.
7. Adult cats usually **sleep or "creep" quietly in the home during the night hours** while kittens enjoy romping around and playing no matter the hour of the day.
8. Most adult cats **know how to use scratching posts** rather than furniture which is a behavior kittens must have trained out of them over time.
9. Adult cats **make great companions** for elderly adopters as they are easier to maintain and are more interested in cuddling than playing.
10. When you adopt an older cat, you are truly making a difference by **giving a great pet a new start in a loving home**.

## the benefit of peace

One of the benefits of having a valid will in place is the peace of mind you experience. To know that a plan is in place and that you have cared for the needs of your loved ones and favorite nonprofits, that you have arranged your affairs thoughtfully, can allow you to sleep more comfortably at night.
