Committing to Community

Since 1965, Animal Humane has been serving homeless pets in New Mexico by placing them in loving homes. While every program within Animal Humane's Circle of Care is vital, adoption remains an essential part of our mission. I am proud of our Adoptions Team's diligent work this past year as they placed 2,676 pets with new families!

This achievement was not without its challenges. In recent years, we have seen a significant increase in obstacles regarding pet adoption and ownership—barriers we are actively trying to overcome.

Last year, 21% of our total intake resulted from owners who had to surrender their beloved pets. Each circumstance was different, and many pets were accompanied by heartbreaking stories. In alignment with our Core Values, each pet and person were treated with the utmost compassion and respect, and through these conversations, we began to see patterns emerge. Pet ownership was becoming more and more difficult, with housing, inflation and veterinary costs being consistent reasons for pets finding themselves in the shelter.

Because of you, Animal Humane can take steps to maximize safety & joy and minimize pain & sorrow for the pets—and now people—who need us. Your support, in tandem with grant funding, helps us continue our Safety Net services, Pet Health Fairs and a biweekly Pet Food Pantry for thousands of pet owners needing support. Safety Net services helped 209 pets stay in homes in 2023, while our Pet Health Fairs supplied vital vaccinations and microchips to 167 total pets. Our Pet Food Pantry was busier than ever this year, passing out over 95,672 pounds of food.

While we hope that our shelter is a last resort, we recognize that it is sometimes a necessary one. And,



for the thousands of pets who find themselves residing with us each year, encouraging adoption remains a vital part of their journeys home. Animal Humane has increased our community presence, bringing adoptable pets to the people who will fall in love with them! We have also seen monumental success in donation-based adoption specials. In 2024, we will continue to offer these adoption specials. By encouraging pet adoption, we hope to place thousands more pets into loving homes!

None of this success would be possible without you. Your support ensures we continue to overcome challenges and ensure the best possible outcome for every pet and person who needs it most. On behalf of them, thank you for the impact you bring to New Mexico's cats and dogs.

When Bart first arrived at Animal Humane in June of 2022, his energy was high, but his spirits were low.

Bart had spent the previous six months of his life living in a kennel in an overcrowded, rural New Mexico shelter. Despite his bubbly personality, Bart was continuously passed over. Life in the shelter began to take its toll, and the shelter knew Bart needed a change. Bart's transfer to Animal Humane came with new sights, smells and, best of all, a new chance to find a family. Less than a month after his arrival, Bart was adopted!

To our surprise, Bart returned to our care in October of 2023.

Despite their love for him, Bart's family was faced with the heartbreaking prospect of saying goodbye after a change in housing policies meant they were no longer allowed to have a pet.

Since the start of 2020, almost 500 pets have been surrendered to Animal Humane because of housing restrictions and size limitations. Finding an affordable



home is difficult. Finding one that allows pets is even harder—and more expensive. These restrictions continue to impact pet owners of both cats and dogs, leading to more and more agonizing decisions like the one Bart's guardians had to make.

Despite our efforts to support cats, dogs and the owners that love them, we continue to see stories like Bart's unfold before our eyes. Thankfully, your support has allowed Animal Humane

to become a safe haven for these pets.

Bart was welcomed back with open paws! Despite having just been separated from his family, his spirit wasn't broken. Bart's bouncy personality quickly caught the eye of a new family, and Bart was adopted again!

Like you, we believe every pet deserves a safe place to wait for a home to call their own. Thank you for helping pets like Bart!



Amanda Pearson: 2023 Adoption Advisor of the Year

Critical to Animal Humane's mission, our Adoptions Team works tirelessly every year to find homes for the thousands of pets that enter our care. In 2023, Amanda Pearson helped 228 of these pets find their forever homes, earning her the honor of being our Adoption Advisor of the Year!

Amanda's passion for adoption started early, making working at Animal Humane a natural fit. "I knew how many pets out there needed help."

While Amanda helped hundreds last year, two particular pups stand out for her.

Aspen, an exuberant two-yearold Shephard was transferred in from another shelter and quickly stole Amanda's heart. Aspen's high level of energy meant he needed some extra attention. Getting to work one on one with the pets is not only Amanda's favorite part of the job but also one of her greatest strengths.

Along with Animal Care and our Behavior Team, our Adoptions Team works hands on with pets, getting to know them and helping them settle into the shelter. If a pet needs extra attention and love, they are selected to work individually with an Adoption Advisor as a Pet Project.



Amanda helped Aspen channel his energy, be it chasing a ball in our on-campus dog park or meeting new friends in a supervised playgroup. With Amanda as his advocate, Aspen quickly found his perfect family.

"I'm always trying to find the right fit," Amanda explained. "I want to set the adopters up for success with their new pet."

Another of Amanda's Pet Projects, Mama Roux, found more than just the right fit- She found her family.

Mama Roux, a sweet Rottweiler, was found as a stray in Rio

Rancho, giving birth to eight puppies two months later. She and her puppies were transferred to Animal Humane and placed with a Foster Caregiver, allowing Mama Roux to raise her puppies. When she came back to the shelter, Mama Roux's fear was immediately clear, and Amanda began working with her to build her confidence.

While Mama Roux spent months in our care, we had no clue her family was out there looking for her.

Shortly before being found as a stray, Mama Roux had escaped from her home while her family was on vacation. When they returned, they had no clue where their beloved pup could be. They spent months searching local shelters before spotting Mama Roux on Animal Humane's website. "They just knew it was her," Amanda remembered.

When her family arrived, Mama Roux transformed in front of Amanda's eyes. "She was so much more comfortable when she saw them. It was great to see."

Now, Aspen and Mama Roux, along with 226 more pets, are spending the start of 2024 where they belong- in the loving arms of their families, in no small part thanks to Amanda's compassion and dedication.

Project Fetch Reaches New Heights

Since 2009, Project Fetch,
Animal Humane's lifesaving
transfer program, has partnered
with multiple shelters across the
state of New Mexico to bring
pets into your loving care. Your

chance at Animal Humane but
freeing up vital space at shelters
that are underfunded and
overcrowded.

Late last year, our team made the 200-mile trip to the Humane Society of Lincoln County in Ruidoso, New Mexico. They are the only animal shelter in the county, receiving a steady stream of intakes. To make their jobs even harder, their pets face limited adoption opportunities as Ruidoso has a high tourist population. They rely on the support that only you, and Animal Humane, can provide through programs like Project Fetch.

This transfer was particularly special as it included our 20,000th pet transferred through this vital program, Gavilan! But Gavilan wasn't the only one writing a happy story ending to their tale that day!

Gavilan's journey home began on Gavilan Canyon Road in Ruidoso. Pet lovers in the Ruidoso community reported sightings of this sweet girl beginning in September. She was surviving on scraps, roadkill and whatever else she could find.

Gavilan managed to stay out of reach, evading capture—and a comfy bed, regular meals, and belly rubs—for three whole months until she was finally caught on November 1. She was brought to Animal Humane where we treated her for fleas and helped her reach a healthy weight. Her sweet demeanor and courageous spirit captured the heart of an adopter, and just seven days after journeying to Albuquerque, Gavilan was making the journey home!

Kovu arrived at the Humane Society of Lincoln County as a small puppy in July of last year. Unfortunately for Kovu, he would grow up in the shelter, spending 105 days, the first three months of life, being consistently overlooked by adopters. We knew that with your help, we could change Kovu's outlook and story, so we loaded him, and nine other pups, up and headed to Albuquerque.

Kovu was neutered and his wait at Animal Humane began. But this playful pup didn't have to wait long! Just 20 days after his arrival, Kovu left the shelter life behind with a home to finally call his own.

all ten cats broke with ringworm.
Because of your support, we were able to not only treat them, but prevent the spread of this contagious infection to the rest of our shelter population—and help protect Lincoln County's population as well. All ten cats recovered beautifully and have all since been adopted!

We recognized Pixel's fear immediately as she shied away from our staff and volunteers. Like you, we believe in meeting every pet where they are and placed Pixel in our Shy Cat Room, a space for more introverted cats who prefer slower introductions.

After four months of shelter life, Pixel was still waiting. Luckily for her, Zachry Wheeler walked through our doors. While he was here to drop off his family's Cat House where he spied Pixel. It was love at first

Pixel's reserved personality immediately drew Zachry



in. "Shy cats deserve a chance," Zachry explained. "I knew we had the space and patience for a cat like her." While many adopters gravitate toward social, outgoing cats, Zachry has a special place in his heart for pets like Pixel.
