We know that this service is vital for our community & shelter pets, and it also helps with the overall health of the pet population. This is especially important, as we continue to see pets entering our care who need medical



intervention. In 2022, 12% of cats that entered our shelter had upper respiratory infections & we can assume that this increase is due to less spay/neuter access across our state. Animal Humane will be re-opening our Donor-subsidized Veterinary Clinic this month, with the focus on providing community pets with affordable preventative care, including spay/neuter surgeries & vaccinations.

I'm excited to watch our team continue our life-saving work through their efforts, passion and perseverance. The gratitude I have for our donors fills my heart and I can't wait to see the impact you will bring to New Mexico's cats & dogs in 2023.

Joyful June Bug

On a seemingly normal day in early October, Sara James was driving down I-25 when she saw a small gray kitten darting across the freeway. Cars continued to whiz by, so Sara immediately pulled over to save the frantic kitten who had just ducked under a barbed wire fence. Using her jacket to protect them both, Sara rescued the kitten and carried her to safety.

The tiny kitten was covered in fleas and her eyes were weepy and begging for help. Considering the kitten's other injuries, Sara could only assume the kitten had been hit by a car. So, Sara brought her to Animal Humane's Donor-subsidized Clinic.

"They not only helped June Bug, but they also helped me calm down. Despite now being covered in fleas, I felt so much better leaving knowing she would

get the help she needed," said Sara.

Because of your support, our Veterinary Team was able to start assessing and treating the fragile feline right away. And June Bug desperately needed help. The fleas covering this little kitten's body had caused anemia, diminishing her energy and her ability to heal. She was given medication to help with the fleas, and iron supplements to support her red blood cell production. Just one day after her harrowing journey to our care, June Bug was in surgery to get spayed and have the fracture in her right hind leg repaired.

A week after her surgery, June Bug's Foster Caregiver brought her to our Veterinary Clinic for a routine follow-up. Our Veterinary Team found that June Bug's fractured leg still wasn't healing properly.

The vulnerable kitten had developed edema in her hind leg. This accumulation of fluid in the tissue surrounding the injury had caused June Bug to lose feeling in her foot and reduced circulation to her toes. Our Team made the difficult decision to amputate the leg to ensure June Bug had the best quality of life moving forward before returning June Bug to the



loving arms of her Foster Caregiver to continue resting and healing.

Despite her difficult start to life, donors like you helped ensure June Bug's future was bright. Joining you in cheering her on was Sara, the hero who brought June Bug to Animal Humane that fall day.

"I called every other day to continue to check on her and see when she would be out of Foster Care. It took me no time to decide that she needed to be in my life forever." said Sara.

Finally, on October 26, just 23 days after her rescue, Sara and June Bug were reunited.

"She is the most loving, brave kitten I have ever met."
Sara shares. "Some people might say her being a
tripod makes her special, but after spending so much
time with her, it's definitely her purr. I feel like it's her
way of telling me she appreciates me, and as long as
I take care of her, she will take care of me."

It takes a community to improve the lives of pets in need. And, without daring rescuers like Sara and generous pet lovers like you, stories such as June Bug's would not be possible. We are forever grateful for the difference you make in the lives of dogs & cats who desperately need a second chance.



As her family packed up their belongings, Sage watched as her future with them began to fade away. Like others nationwide, Sage's family had come to the difficult decision to surrender their beloved pet, as they needed to move to smaller housing. Thankfully, they brought Sage to us. As our Behavior Team started working with Sage, they found most of her fear came from a hand being raised or moving near her. To help her learn that human hands were nothing to be frightened of, our Team Members took turns using hand targeting and other exposure therapies to desensitize Sage to normal movements. By using

treats, which Sage was a big fan of, and pairing them with touch Sage began to progress! Soon, she was ready to graduate and begin meeting with potential adopters.

Just two weeks later, as she was scrolling through dogs who were available at various Albuquerque shelters, Rose spied Sage.

"My husband and I had been looking for about two years for a pet to add to our family," Sage's picture to my husband and said, 'This is the one! We have to go get her! It was as if she was staring right at me saying, 'Come and get me'." Rose and her husband came spent time counseling them on her history and fear. Rose sat on the ground in the Bonding Room, quietly talking to Sage. Sage eventually came up to her, and their connection hasn't wavered since. They took her home that same day!

As Sage bonded with her new family, just one week after her adoption, something incredible happened.

"One day my mom was visiting because I had just gotten out of the hospital. Suddenly, I had a very bad seizure, but my mom and husband were across the room. Sage immediately stood up on a chair to get everyone's attention and alert them that I was having a seizure." said Rose. "I have to say, Sage



must be the smartest dog we have ever had. From that day on she has stayed by my side and now we take good care of each other."

As fellow pet lovers, you know firsthand the incredible, unconditional bond people can build with the pets around them. The connection that Sage and Rose share is no different, a connection made possible by you.

Sage has continued to alert those around her when Rose is having a medical episode, even going so far as to wake Rose's husband up when she needs help. Now starting medical treatment at the Mayo Clinic in Arizona, Rose needs Sage's support more than ever. Thank you for helping pets and the people who love them.

Adoptable senior dogs sometimes get the short end of the stick – but not Henry. This seven-year-old Great Pyrenees Spaniel cross was transferred to Animal Humane from the Espanola Valley Humane Society. Just 12 days after, he found himself enjoying tummy rubs, camping, and constant companionship with his new forever family, Brian and Michele Leist.

While Henry's cuteness and loveable nature contributed to his adoptability, so did the generosity of human health care provider Optum New Mexico. Since August, Optum NM has sponsored the adoption fees of 14 senior dogs and cats, Henry among them.

"Our focus is preventive care with an emphasis on people 65 and older, and it has been well documented that the companionship of a pet has numerous health benefits," said Optum NM's Marketing Director, Erica Krause Muñoz. "By sponsoring senior pets, we hope to not only save an animal life but also add to the quality of life of the people who adopt them."

Studies have shown that the bond between people and their pets is linked to several health benefits, according to the Centers for Disease Control. These benefits include decreased blood pressure, cholesterol levels, triglyceride levels, feelings of loneliness, anxiety, and symptoms of PTSD; pets have also been shown to increase opportunities for exercise and outdoor activities; facilitate improved cognitive function in older adults; and encourage more opportunities to socialize.

Though Henry's new mom, Michele, recently retired, Henry isn't about to let her sit still or be alone



"He goes wherever she goes, whether it be in the living room, the bedroom or the car," Brian said of his wife and their pup. "Henry just wants to be with us. He loves taking a walk every day. He loves chasing the ball in the house or in the backyard. We gave him a teddy bear, which is half his size, and the stuffing is gone from the bear's head already."

Thanks to Optum NM and donors like you, Henry is living his best life in his golden years. However, older cats and dogs often stay in shelters longer than their younger counterparts.

Animal Humane, which defines a senior pet as age 6 and older, finds that many potential adopters mistakenly believe that older pets are at a shelter because something is wrong with them. Nothing could be further from the truth. Like you, Optum and Animal Humane know that senior pets are simply waiting for their next loving home.

Most of the time, adult pets end up in a shelter due to lifestyle or financial changes in a home rather than through any fault of their own.

One of the best aspects of adopting an older animal is that what you see is what you get. These pets come with life skills already in place. They know how to walk on a leash. They're housebroken. They may even know "sit," "stay" and other cues. While joyful surprises are a boon of pet ownership, size, personality, and weight won't be included when you adopt a senior pet.

Michele and Brian, for example, aren't going to be surprised in a few years with how big Henry is. His 90 pounds of love at the time of adoption is as big as he will get.

"We have a soft spot for senior dogs," Brian said.

With Brian and Michele's help, Henry has discovered a love for camping and he has claimed the sofa in their travel trailer as his own, eager for his next adventure.

"We are looking forward to this spring and trying out the canoe with Henry," Brian said. "Life vests for all!"

For Shelter Pets



We are always surprised by the creative ways people find to support pets in need! This past fall, we were delighted by an especially innovative fundraiser two men found to support homeless pets. By combining their love of fitness and their love for pets, Kevin and Akhil were able to raise over \$1,000 during a deadlifting competition at Iron Soul Gym.

"My wife and I adopted Jersey, a Pitbull Boxer mix from a rescue in Birmingham, Alabama. Before she got to the rescue, she had a tough life," Akhil said. "She was bred for dog fighting and suffered from heartworm and years of physical abuse. Jersey really changed my life, so I have had strong feelings towards rescues ever since."

When Akhil approached his friend, Kevin, about the idea of choosing Animal Humane for their upcoming deadlifting competition, Kevin was on board!

"My mom and I got involved with a Beagle rescue group in Maryland about 14 years ago. Those volunteering moments made me aware of the immense need for society to help adoptable animals. While I haven't had the time to volunteer like I did in high school, I've wanted to continue supporting animal rescues because of how impactful they are to our lives and society," said Kevin.

Kevin and Akhil began spreading the word about their deadlifting competition and how people could support Animal Humane through them.

"People pledged a certain amount of money per pound. So as Akhil and I went up in weight that we lifted, we were able to raise more and more money," Both Kevin and Akhil took on the challenge to lift as much as they could! On their final attempt, Akhil lifted 375 pounds and Kevin lifted 530 pounds!

"I've found that raising money for good causes through personal challenges like marathoning or deadlifting sets everyone up for success. It motivates me to train and do better during the challenges and gives organizations like Animal Humane the support they need to keep doing their good work," Kevin adds.

He was particularly nervous around individuals who are male presenting. So, an integral part of his training was desensitizing him to those who are male presenting through calm & controlled exposure. Naga's plan also encouraged a variety of volunteers to spend quality time with him in his kennel, so he could learn that humans could be trusted and conquer his fears!

Over time, many potential adopters met with Naga, but none were the right fit. Naga needed more time, and because of donors like you, we were able to give him just that.

Months passed and Naga stayed ever patient waiting for his perfect person to come take him home.

Finally, one September morning, his dreams came true. Mariah walked into Animal Humane looking for a friend for Ghost, the Animal Humane Alum she adopted in July. She had originally noticed Naga then, as she visited our Main Campus to meet with Ghost.

Mariah put Naga on hold and, given Naga's history, she brought her two male roommates, along with Ghost, to Campus the very next day. Thanks to the behavior support you facilitated, Naga's introduction to Ghost was a resounding success.

"It couldn't have gone better," Mariah explained.
"It took Naga a few minutes to get comfortable with the guys, but Ghost and Naga started playing right away." Mariah knew Ghost had found his forever friend and she adopted Naga that same day.
