Flexibility.

A precious donor once told me "if you don't bend with the wind, you're going to die." These words of wisdom were spoken in an enduring southern drawl and have proven to be sage advice.

In animal welfare flexibility is key.

Because we never know what opportunities will be presented at a moment's notice or when we will be called upon to save lives.

That's what happened late Friday, April 29, when the plea came to assist the Animal Welfare Coalition (AWC) of Northeastern New Mexico shelter in Las Vegas, New Mexico who were in the path of the combined Calf's Canyon & Hermit's Peak fires.

Driving toward the fire was ominous. We could see & taste the smoke from the outskirts of town, and view the flames once arriving at AWC. It was likely, but not yet known, the entire shelter would have to be evacuated. We left with 19 dogs, who were lovingly received by our Animal Care & Adoptions Teams following our 127-mile journey home.

From that phone call to writing these words, from my heart to yours, many parts have moved & continue churning on behalf of pets.

With your support we set up temporary kennels at NMDOG and relocated them 72 hours later to the Santa Fe Fairgrounds evacuation shelter. We delivered kibble, bedding, carriers & office supplies to aid the tracking of pets at the Glorieta evacuation headquarters, which was being overseen by Bernalillo County Animal Care



& Control staff. And we moved our shelter pets into foster care to create space for more dogs, transferred in cats from the Santa Fe Animal Shelter & Humane Society allowing them to harbor owned felines, and we requested donations of needed items from our generous donors to further support pets & owners displaced by the fires ...the pieces keep moving & snapping into place.



your support gave a once anxious dog tips to settle into her forever family




When we are scared or anxious, our pets have the amazing ability to comfort us. Their closeness & dependability make us certain that we can overcome any obstacles life sends our way. But when the situation is reversed, and our pets need our help to destress, finding the right resources are crucial to ensure they lead happy & healthy lives.

When Ava first came to Animal Humane, she was an excited ball of energy. Because she couldn't control her constant tail-wagging, a sign of her lively disposition, our Clinic Team needed to treat her for repeatedly knocking it against hard surfaces – a condition known as happy tail. This Black Lab had so much love to give, and, thankfully, she had you to make sure she received the veterinary care & time she needed to find her new family.

A week after Ava's arrival, the peppy pup went home with Julia & her family. As Julia explains, Ava's name was a good omen from the start. "Our son's favorite book at the time was called Ava's Spectacular Spectacles, so we took it as a sign that she was meant to be ours."

Although Ava was safe & sound



in a loving home, she, like many precious pets, found it hard to find ways to harness all of her energy. "Ava's early days were an adventure," said Julia. "She managed to jump out of our backyard, chew her collar off and take herself on a walk around the neighborhood."

Initially, Julia & her family struggled to make sure that Ava had ways to keep herself mentally and physically stimulated, so she would be safe at home. And, when they needed help the most, they knew to turn to our Behavior Team for advice. "We contacted Animal Humane for behavior help and I am forever grateful for the tips &

support we received," explained Julia. "Ava took an obedience class, we received several great tips from the Behavior Helpline & a dog trainer [from The Center at Animal Humane] came to our house to observe us, where she showed us how to train Ava and help her burn off her energy."

Ava & her new family faced a difficult adjustment period, but you stepped into their lives & provided them with the tools to make Ava's second chance count!



Two Blind Cats ...





find hope & healing through Animal Humane

Surrendered to Animal Humane last fall, Wilikins and his sister, Mrs. Mary Rodgers, couldn't see very well.

Our Clinic Team immediately went to work to diagnose Wilikins & Mary. Because both cats were blind at a young age, genetically related, and had shared the same environment, our Team considered genetic

as well as infectious causes for their surprising blindness. After a thorough work up, however, our veterinarians determined that the origins were neither infectious nor metabolic.

Luckily, Wilikins & Mary had you by their side to guide them through life's challenges and into loving forever homes.

We sent the siblings for a special retinal exam with a

veterinary ophthalmologist. The ophthalmologist concluded that Wilikins & Mary had progressive retinal atrophy (PRA), a condition that caused their eye cells to prematurely deteriorate.

Further complicating our care of these sweet felines — both were significantly overweight. And, although there is no cure for PRA, our Clinic and Animal

Care Teams were able to work with both cats to lose weight. Wilikins & Mary were placed on a special diet plan to manage their obesity. To encourage movement the Team introduced new toys and used food-based puzzles for feeding. As a result, Wilikins and Mary lost three pounds each. And, best of all, both cats were adopted by owners ready to care for their special needs.

Wilikins & Mary have already made quite the impact on their adopters. When Wilikin's adopter, Noah Friz, first saw the white feline, he noted that the cat's lovability immediately sealed the deal. "It was the cute chubby face and adorably large eyes that drew us in initially. We knew it would take some work to

get him to a healthier place but felt it would be worth it."

Likewise, after Charles Benefiel took Mrs. Mary Rodgers home, he found that the cat's special needs were no match for her loving demeanor. "Mary has a beautiful and sweet personality and is oblivious to challenges due to her sight and weights issues," says Charles. "My favorite thing that she does is feel my face with her paws in a full embrace while giving me face rubs with her nose."

Thanks to you, both cats are free to play with toys, bond with new friends & family members, and live comfortably despite having special needs. For Wilikins & Mary, the road forward is already looking clearer!

from rescued to rescuer



"My mother has diabetes and one night she had a sugar low between 2-3 am. She got something to eat in the kitchen, swallowed the wrong way and began to cough. Kazzy heard the commotion and let out a small bark. This woke me, but when I called her up to bed, she continued to look at my bedroom door. Something was amiss, so I got up, finally hearing my mother was in trouble and made sure she was ok. I was able to help my mom calm down and she was very thankful to have someone to help. I am very glad Kazzy did this; there was a real chance my mother could've fallen. I find that I sleep a lot better knowing Kazzy can wake me if something similar happens again."

Your generosity and kindness gave Kazzy a second chance, and she used hers to rescue a family member in trouble. Now that Kazzy has proven to be an invaluable addition to her new family, she's settling in quite nicely with her siblings. She often sleeps at the foot of Karen's bed with Cara the Calico and plays chase in the mornings with Mia. The sky's the limit for Kazzy, and she owes it all to you!


